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# A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE CHURCH

This Church was organized in 1616 in Southwark, London, England, by Rev. Henry Jacob, who had been a minister of the Church of England, and had left it because of its errors and corruption. We learn from reliable sources that Mr. Jacob was a native of Kent, a graduate from Oxford, a man.of great intellect and learning. He was pastor of the Middleburg Church; because of persecution by Archbishop Bancroft, for a while he was resident with Rev. John Robinson of Leyden, who like himself was a dissenter and because of persecution moved to Holland in 1608.

Mr. Neal tells us: "That after a conference with Mr. Robinson, that Mr. Jacob embraced his views, and in 1610 published a treatis at Leyden entitled 'The Divine Beginning an Institution of Christ's True, Vis-

sible and Material Church."

After varied experience on the Continent, Mr. Jacob returned to England, and summoned several of his friends together, and made known to them his design to set up a separate congregation, that they might enjoy the ordinances of Christ in a more pure manner, which was not condemned as unlawful, considering that there was no prospect of a national reformation, and they consented to unite in Church fellowship. Having set apart a day of prayer and fasting for Divine blessing on their undertaking, and making open confession of their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, and solemnly convenanting with each other in the presence of God to walk in all of his ordinances. Thus the foundation was laid of the first Congregational Church organized by that name in England.

After the organization of the Church, Mr. Jacob was its pastor for eight years. Owing to violent persecution against him and his Church, he left England and came to America in 1624. He settled in Virginia where he soon died.

It has been said: "That the first Baptist Church in England came out of the Henry Jacob Church." It is quite possible that the old West Barnstable Church is the mother of English Baptist. Of the introduction of Baptist views into England we have no certain knowledge.

Fox relates: "That the registers of London make mention of certain Dutchmen counted for Anabaptist, of whom ten were put to death in sundry places in the realm, Anno 1535; other ten repented and were saved.

About the beginning of the 17th century the severe laws against the Puritans led many dissenters to emmigrate to Holland. Some of these were Baptist, and an English Baptist Church was formed in Amsterdam about the year 1609. . . An independent congregation in London, gathered in 1616, included several such persons; as the Church was larger than could conveniently meet in times of persecution, they agreed to allow these persons to constitute a distinct Church which was formed on the 12th of September, 1633; and upon this most, if not all the members of the new Church were baptised."

In 1625 the Rev. John Lothrop, who also was a dissenting minister of the English Church, became the second pastor of this Church, and continued its pastor for about nine years in England. Mr. Lothrop is mentioned by Anthony Wood as having been celebrated. He held the living of Egerton in Kent where he resided, but embracing the sentiments of the Puritans, he renounced his orders, and going to London, succeeded Henry Jacob.

Mr. Lothrop, the first pastor, both of Scituate and Barnstable was, according to Neal, "A man of learning and of a meek and quiet spirit. Lowly in the dispensation of the word of God, studious of peace, and furnished with godly contentment, willing to spend and be spent for the cause and the Church of Christ." (Bayle's history of Old Plymouth, Vol. 1, Page 299.)

In the Spring of 1632, Mr. Lothrop and his congregation were discovered worshipping in a house belonging to a Mr. Humphry Barnet, by a servant of Bishop Laud, and forty-two of the congregation with Mr. Lothrop were apprehended and cast in prison, eighteen escaped; the others continued in prison for about two years when they were released on bail, all except Mr. Lothrop. After many efforts for his release, he finally petitioned the king, who granted a release on condition that he should leave the kingdom. "Up to 1640 little formal progress was made. Churches did not multiply; Laud was too active, and the Star Chamber was too vigorous. But their progress was immense."

In 1634, Mr. Lothrop with thirty-four of his Church and congregation came and settled in Scituate. From Deane's History of Scituate we learn that "Mr. Lothrop with the greater part of his Church and congregation removed to Barnstable in 1639, ostensibly for the benefit of the hay grounds, i. e., the Salt Marshes, but probably with a view also to avoid the agitations which began to trouble the Church and people, on two subjects, viz. that of the mode of baptism, and that of removing their Meeting House farther to the South part of the plantation."

From the same source under the date of Feb. 2, 1642: "Whereas in former tyme, whilst Mr. Lothrop was at Scituate, Mr. William Vassal, Thomas King, Thomas Lapham, Judith Vassal, Suza King, Anna


Stockbridge, together with many more were together in convenant in one Church, and that many of them, with Mr. Lothrop, our Pastor, departed and went to live in Barnstable, and did leave one part of the Church at Scituate, who by the consent of all the Church, became a Church, remaining a Church, and admitted into their fellowship John Twisden and many more, and so continued one Church for some time."

. From the foregoing we may infer either that the part of the Church that was left behind organized themselves in a new Church, or by the consent of the part that remained continued a Church without organization.

Rev. Mr. Allen, the present pastor of West Barnstable Church has recently learned from a letter received from London, that the part of the Henry Jacob Church that Mr. Lothrop left in England continued a Church.

From Bayles History of Plymouth, Vol. 1, Page 299: "A large proportion of the settlers of Scituate became dissatisfied with their situation and desirous for a change; amongst the most zealous of those who were for removing was Mr. Lothrop the pastor. At first they designed to remove to Sepeican (now Rochester) and in 1638 the land then was granted by the general court to Thomas Bisbee (Besbeech), James Cudworth, William Gilson, Anthony Anable, Henry Cobb, Henry Rowley, Edward Foster, and Robert Linnett, a committee of Scituate, for a seating of a Township for a congregation. This grant was not accepted, and the Sepeican lands were not settled until after Philip's war. In 1639 Mr. Lothrop and a majority of his Church removed from Scituate and settled in Barnstable. Those who moved to Barnstable were Anthony Anable, Henry Cobb, who died in 1679, and was ruling Elder. Isaac Robinson, the son of the pastor of the Leyden Church, James Cudworth, afterwards General

in Philip's war, an assistant, returned to Scituate, as a freeman in 1633. Samuel Fuller, James Cooper, Henry Rowley, George Lewis, Benjamin Lumbard, Rev. John Lothrop, Henry Bourne, Samuel Hinckley in 1637, father of Thomas Hinckley, the Governor. Edward Fitzrandle, William Caseley, Robert Linnett, Mr. Thomas Dimmack, Henry Ewell, William Crocker, Isaac Wells, Edward Caseley. In 1640 William Parker, and in 1649 John Allen went there from Scituate."

It was Oct. 11, 1639 that Mr. Lothrop and the majority of his people arrived in Barnstable. Here he continued pastor until his death, Nov. 8, 1653. The whole period covered by his ministry was 28 years, including nine in England, five in Scituate, and fourteen in Barn-

It is not known how many members there were in the church when Mr. Lothrop died.\* During the ministry of Mr. Lothrop, it is known that there was a revival of

religion and many were added to the church.

After the death of Mr. Lothrop the church was destitute of a pastor for about 10 years. We learn from Freeman's History of Cape Cod, Vol. 2, page 263, "That a Mr. William Sergeant officiated for a time, also a Rev. John Smith is reported to have officiated for a while," and a Mr. John Mayo of Eastham supplied as a teacher. From the following note there appears to have been but little union in the church during these ten years: "Plymouth Church records." Nov., 1654. The unhappy difficulties that fell out in the church at Be (Barnstable) had such an ill influence on the church at Plymouth, that together with the un-

<sup>\*</sup> The above statement has been made by previous writers, and afterwards the same writers have claimed to give the exact number of all who have united with the church. The Old Records only give a copy of a list of 153 persons who were baptized by Mr. Lothrop. These may have been counted as members of the church. Undoubtedly many of them were.


settledness of the church, and the going away of div-'ers of its members, yea, of the most eminent of them, it was the means of the unsettlement of that holy man of God, Rev. John Reynor its Pastor." (Freeman's History, Vol. 2, page 262.)

The Rev. Thomas Walley was ordained as pastor in 1663. He continued in that capacity for 15 years.

He was born in England in 1616, and educated in one of her Universities. He came to America, March 23, 1662. In the Old Church Records it is written of him: "The Lord was pleased to make him a blessed peacemaker, and improved him in ye work of his house here, till March 28th, 1678, being Lord's day morning, about forenoon meeting time, and then he called him out of his earthly tabernacle into that house not made with hands."

We have no record of baptisms or members received by Mr. Walley. When Mr. Russell began his labors there was found to be seventy-four members and one hundred and seventy-two baptisms. How many of these were baptized and admitted to the church during Mr. Walley's ministry is not known, for there is nothing in our records to show. We have but a very little recorded by Mr. Walley.

Five years after the death of Mr. Walley, in 1683, Rev. Jonathan Russell was ordained. He continued as pastor until his death, February 2nd, 1711, a period of twenty-eight years. During his ministry one hundred and seventy-one were added to the church, and four hundred and fifty-two received baptism. His son, Rev. Jonathan Russell succeeded him in his pastoral office. He was ordained in 1712. He was a faithful minister until his death, September 10th, 1759, a period of forty-seven years. During that time two hundred and forty-two were added to the church, and five hundred and sixty-three received baptism.



In 1716 there was a movement made by some of the Church and society to divide the town in two precincts; but it was strongly opposed by some of the members. The reason given by its advocates of the division was: "That the inhabitants had become so numerous and widely scattered over this large town, that it was exceedingly inconvenient for them to attend meeting in one place." "As they could not agree on this Question, a council of ministers and Churches was called to come and settle it, which was soon done by their advice, and was assented to by all parts of the town."

The following copied from the Old Records shows

the results of the division:

"In Feb., 1716, we had a council when leave was given by ye Chh to ye Breen concerned in the New Meeting-house to get a suitable person to dispense ye Word to them till such a time as ve town should be divided into precincts which was some time after, and then they put me upon making my choice which precinct I would chose to be of and preach too. The motion was made by some particular persons. This was in April 1718, but my reply to them was that when each precinct had once met the Engaged to fulfil the town contract then I would make my choice. But the West End not having the meeting house ready did nothing So it was Aug. 1719 before I took my choice and the first of my preaching in the West meeting was on Thanksgiving day Nov. 1719. And then the Old meeting-house being deserted ye pp below of ye East precinct went out for a minister Deacon Childs went and obtained Mr. Welstead who tarryd with them about six weeks, and then went home. After him they had several ministers preached, some of them were called in order to settle att length Mr. Green of Boston was called upon probation."

The division line between the two precincts began a little East of Joseph Crocker's place and running South to Oyster River. Mr. Russell when he made choice of the West precinct held the records of the Church, and continued his ministry and pastorate of this part of the

. Church without organization. Sixty-four members were dismissed to form a Church in the East precinct, and they called a council which organized and constituted them a regular Independent Congregational Church.

Previous to this two Meeting houses had been built. The first Meeting house erected in Barnstable was in 1646 on what was then known as Lothrop's Hill. On the South side of the road on or near the spot where the barn now stands, owned by Henry M. Hutchings.

The second edifice larger than the first was erected in 1681 on the hill near great pond, or Coggin's pond. The Meeting house at West Barnstable was built in 1717 and has twice been remodeled.

### SACRAMENT ROCK

Upon which tradition says: "The Church celebrated its first communion service was situated between West and East Barnstable not far from the grave of Gov. Hinckley." Tradition says: "That here also on or around this rock the town assembled its first town meeting." The old Tankard that the Church brought with them from England is still in possession of the Church of West Barnstable. The material of which it is made has been called pewter. When I lived in West Barnstable, I was told by an English visitor that the material of which it was made was one of England's lost arts. But since have learned that it was made in the reign of Charles II and Henrietta Maria. The decoration is pounced.

Aug., 1760, Rev. Oakes Shaw was ordained, and succeeded Mr. Russell. He was the father of Chief Justice Lemuel Shaw, of whom it was said that "He held the scales of justice so evenly they were never known to tremble in his hand." Mr. Shaw's ministry covered a period of forty-six years. He died Feb. 11, 1807. During his ministry 240 were admitted to the

Church and 366 baptised.

Rev. Enoch Pratt was ordained Oct. 28, 1807. He continued his ministry until Oct. 8, 1835. Mr. Pratt was dismissed at his own request. During his ministry 272 were admitted to the Church and 380 baptised. Mr. Pratt was born in North Middleboro, graduated from Brown's University in 1803, then studied for his profession for three years with Dr. Kirkland and Dr. Harris. He was licensed by the Boston Association to preach. At the time he came to Barnstable the Church membership was 100, and the parish embraced half of the town. "At that time and for several years afterward almost every person attended on the Sabbath, even from the remotest part of the place; so that, although the meeting house was very large, it could hardly contain the attending congregation. men, ladies and children would walk six miles to meeting, and old men with their wives would ride on horse back half way, then tie the horse when they had a horse block and walk the remainder of the way. The owner of the horse did not claim his right in it on the Sabbath, for meeting riding, more than his neighbor. This Church has been one of the largest Churches and parishes in the state, excepting in the cities. After 1820 other denominations began to spring up." (Pratt's Unpublished Notes.)

May 18, 1836, Rev. Alfred Greenwood of Boston was ordained pastor and dismissed May 5, 1840. Ten were admitted to the Church and nine baptised.

Oct. 28, 1840, Rev. Thomas Riggs was installed pastor, and dismissed Aug. 2, 1842. Three were admitted to the Church, and eight received baptism.

Rev. Alonzo Hayes was ordained pastor May 24, 1843. During his ministry twenty-two were added to the Church, and twenty baptised. He was dismissed July 9, 1850.

Rev. Ebenezer Chase supplied the pulpit for seven months in 1850. In 1852 the old Church built in 1717 was remodeled, and rededicated Nov. 18, 1852.

December, 1852, Rev. Hiram Carlton became acting pastor and continued as such until March, 1861.

Under his ministry thirty were admitted to the

Church and thirty-one baptised.

May 20, 1863, Rev. Henry Goodhue was ordained pastor. Fifty-three united with the Church and thirtytwo baptised during his ministry. He was dismissed at

his own request June 18, 1883.

Rev. Robert Samuel supplied the Church as acting pastor from July, 1883, to Sept., 1886. Mr. Samuel was born in Renfrewshire, Scotland, June 18, 1818; a graduate of Dartmouth college, 1856. Studied theology at Andover and Chicago Seminaries. Served in the Christian Commission during the latter part of the Civil war. During his ministry nine united with the Church.

Rev. Jeremiah K. Aldrich supplied the Church from Oct. 31, 1886 to March 30, 1890. During his ministry seven united with the Church and four received bap-

tism.

From March 30, to Oct. 1, the Church had several supplies. During that time seven united with the Church.

Oct. 1, 1890, Rev. Hanson E. Thygesen was called and became acting pastor until April 15, 1894. Twelve united with the Church and nine received baptism.

Rev. Samuel W. Clark. May 22, 1894, began as a supply and continued acting pastor until 1897. Seven

united with the Church during his ministry.

In 1897, Rev. Edgar B. French was ordained pastor and continued its pastor until 1903. Nine united with the Church during his ministry.

Rev. Charles S. Bates was pastor from 1903 to 1906.

Rev. Gregory Sherajan supplied the pulpit from 1906 to Nov., 1907.

Rev. Samuel B. Andrews was called to be pastor. Dec., 1907, and served the Church until his death, Oct. 27, 1910. A man of most excellent Christian spirit, and ever found faithful in the service of his Master. He was truly a man of God.

Rev. Willard E. Streeter was pastor from May 1,

1911 to May 1, 1913.

Rev. George E. Allen was called May 1, 1915, and is now acting pastor. At the present time twelve have united with the Church under his ministry.

## CONFESSION OF FAITH

Adopted at Kansas City, Oct. 25, 1913, by the National Council We believe in God the Father, infinite in wisdom, goodness, and love; and in Jesus Christ, his Son, our Lord and Saviour, who for us and our salvation lived and died and liveth evermore; and in the Holy Spirit, who taketh of the things of Christ and revealeth them to us, renewing, comforting, and inspiring the souls of men. We are united in striving to know the will of God as taught in the Holy Scriptures, and in our purpose to walk in the ways of the Lord, made known or to be made known to us. We hold it to be the mission of the Church of Christ to proclaim the Gospel to all mankind, exalting the worship of the one true God, and laboring for the progress of knowledge, the promotion of justice, the triumph of peace, and the realization of human brotherhood. Depending, as did our fathers upon the continued guidance of the Holy Spirit to lead us into all truth, we work and pray for the transformation of the world into the kingdom of God; and we look with faith for the triumph of righteousness and for life and glory everlasting. Amen.

### FORM OF ADMISSION

(Here administer baptism.)

To the Candidates: You now present yourselves before God and in the sight of men to confess your faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, as your chosen Saviour, and you promise by Divine Help to dedicate all of your powers and faculties to his glory, and to the promotion of his kingdom.

By uniting with this church you promise to strive for its peace, edification and purity, and walk with its members in Christian love. This you promise, convenant and engage, and to the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, for the glory of God and the good of your fellowmen you do consecrate your life.

(The church will rise.)

#### WELCOME

This church now extends to you an affectionate welcome to its communion and fellowship, engaging to watch over you in love and to promote your moral and spiritual welfare.

"Now unto him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy. To the only wise God our Saviour be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever. Amen."

#### RULES OF GOVERNMENT

- 1. The permanent officers of this church, are its Pastor, or Pastors, Deacons, Clerk, Treasurer, and the Superintendent of the Sunday School.
- 2. The Pastor shall be moderator of the business meetings of the church, and shall have an oversight in all of its affairs when present, administering the ordinances of the gospel and working for its spiritual growth and welfare.
- 3. The Deacons shall assist the pastor in administering the ordinances, visiting the sick and relieving the temporal wants of the poor, be advisors of the Pastor, and in any way aid him in the spiritual care of the church.
- 4. The Clerk shall keep a complete list of the members of the church, and a true record of all of its business transactions. He shall also record Baptisms, and conduct the correspondence of the church.
- 5. The Treasurer shall receive all collections or funds of the church, and apply them according to its direction, and report the same annually.
- 6. The Superintendent of the Sunday School shall be an evangelical Christian, and shall have charge of this important branch of church work, and shall advise and co-operate with the Pastor in all matters affecting its relation to the church.

#### **MEMBERSHIP**

1. All persons desiring to unite with this church by profession, may be examined as to their faith at any regular church meeting, or by a committee chosen by the church, and if ap-

proved their names shall be read to the church at least one week before their admission.

- 2. Members of other evangelical churches worshipping statedly with us are cordially invited to unite with this church.
- 3. Members may be dismissed by letters to other churches, and all members who move out of town are expected to take letters of dismission to some other evangelical church.
- 4. Discipline: The rules of discipline shall be according to Matt. 18:15, 16, 17: (15) "Moreover, if thy brother shall trespass against thee, go and tell him his fault between thee and him alone: if he shall hear thee, thou hast gained thy brother." (16) "But if he will not hear thee, then take with thee one or two more, that in the mouth of two or three witnesses every word may be established." (17) "And if he shall neglect to hear them, tell it unto the church: but if he neglect to hear the church, let him be unto thee as an heathen man and a publican."
- 5. The Lord's Supper: On the first Sundays in January, March, May, July, September, and November.




