West Parish Family School

We started March with a visit from the Cat in the Hat, who visited the school for Dr. Seuss' birthday. The Cat in the Hat read <u>The Cat in the Hat</u> and <u>Green Eggs and Ham</u> to the whole school in Jenkins Hall.



Chickadees, the youngest toddler classroom, made lions to bring in the month of March by mixing yellow and orange paints to paint paper plates to make lion faces. They loved hearing <u>Llama Llama Misses Mama</u>, Yummy, Yucky an opposites book, and Splash. - Miss B, Miss Sue, and Miss Cordelia



Toucans, the middle toddler classroom, made wildflower goop by mixing cornstarch and water. In keeping with reading Dr. Seuss books, they read <u>Fox in Socks</u> and <u>The Lorax</u>. The students made truffula trees using coffee filters decorated with marker dots. They then "watered" the trees and watched what happened to the marker dots. - Miss Brie, Miss Jillian, and Miss Devan

Cockatoos, the oldest toddler classroom, learned about transportation. They painted with cars, and pushed them down a ramp. They also enjoyed their rainy day walk which includ-

ed lots of puddle jumping. - Miss Sylver, Miss Anne, and Miss Anna

The **Sun Rays** preschool classroom celebrated March by making St. Patrick's Day hats with rainbow streamers and read <u>How to Catch a Leprechaun</u>. - Miss Selina and Miss Jillian

The **Little Explorers** read <u>The Little Leprechaun</u>. The students made a rainbow pot of gold and put the first letter of their names into the pot. There was also dancing the Irish jig and looking for clovers in the grassy field and leprechaun footprints. - Miss Margo and Miss Erika

Upstairs in the **Lemon Drops** classroom the students read <u>Miss Rumphius</u>, and made a mural of all the things that remind them of spring. They also read <u>How to Catch a Leprechaun</u> and then made blueprints on their leprechaun traps. - Miss Hannah and Miss Nicolle

In **Radiant Rainbows**, the students learned about 6 simple machines: ramps, pulleys, levers, screws, wedges, and the wheel and axle. They then applied this knowledge to their leprechaun traps made from shoeboxes which were painted green, decorated with rainbows and each had a pot of gold to lure the leprechauns. Unfortunately, the students were unsuccessful catching any leprechauns and the leprechauns made a mess of the classroom leaving glitter all over, chairs on their sides, green footprints. They left a scavenger hunt for the students to find a lucky charm snack which the students loved. - Miss Anne, Miss Lenora, Miss Stephanie, and Miss Hillary



Literacy Lolapalooza - Miss Hillary comes in weekly to work in small groups in the Preschool and Pre-K classes to work on letter identification, rhymes, and games with literacy links.

Science - Miss Debbie comes in to share STEM lessons tailored to each age group each week. This month the students learned about wind, the differences between shamrocks and clovers, and animals we see in the spring.

If you have an IRA and are required to take a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) PLEASE read this article!

The following are excerpts from an article in the Wall Street Journal:

"Seniors who give money to charity to lower their taxable income often make a mistake. They withdraw money from their bank account or a traditional IRA and then write a check to the nonprofit of their choice. As a result, they are missing a valuable tax deduction.

Instead, tax pros say they should use a qualified charitable distribution, or QCD, which allows individuals over 70 and ½ (currently 73) to transfer up to \$100,000 a year from their traditional IRA directly to a charity tax free even if they are itemizing deductions. Married couples can transfer up to \$200,000.

In years when you have to take the annual withdrawal known as a required minimum distribution, or RMD, you can direct your administrator to direct your distribution as a QCD to an eligible charity. That would exclude that RMD distribution from your taxable income."

West Parish of Barnstable is an eligible charity. You can have your administrator send the check to West Parish, or send the check to you to give to West Parish, or some IRA administrators will provide you a checkbook from which you can write checks directly to charities. I know that TDAmertrade and Schwab both will issue you a checkbook. In all cases the check must be made out to the charity. Using this method to contribute lowers your gross income and your taxes. It also lowers the income used by Medicare to compute the costs of your monthly premium. And, if you itemize, it lowers the threshold for taking a medical expense deduction. And it may also impact other calculations like how much of your Social Security is taxable.

"Tax professionals caution that this QCD issue can be tricky because custodians of qualified retirement accounts such as IRAs aren't required to break down distributions from an account that went to charity. They just provide the gross distribution amount on the 1099-R Tax Form. It is up to the taxpayer to sort this out and make sure it is reported correctly to his or her tax preparer."

This really isn't that hard, especially if your administrator/custodian gives you a checkbook. The Checks would also be listed as "Transactions" on your Monthly reports from your administrator, although not shown as a distribution to a charity.

Your final authority on taxes will be your tax preparer who I'm confident will agree that the above is the best way to give to charity and lower your taxes. I am quite familiar with this topic and am willing to answer any question you might have.

"Easter isn't just one day—it is an entire season. The next fifty days celebrate Jesus' victory over Sin and Death—which is even longer than Lent. It's a reversal that resounds through all time and eternity, but can we party that long?

Perhaps you sensed the immediacy of it, like the women at the tomb when they were told by two bright angels that Jesus was not there because He had risen from the dead.
